

Head Start & Early Head Start

Every child, regardless of circumstances at birth, has the ability to reach their full potential.

BACKGROUND

In 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson launched the War on Poverty, recognizing education as the key to breaking the cycle of poverty. As a part of this effort, Project Head Start was established to provide early childhood education and family support. Early Head Start serves expectant families and infants through age three, and Head Start Preschool serves children ages three to five.

The YMCA of Metro Atlanta (the Y) has been a trusted Head Start provider since 1999, impacting over 3,000 children every day with the education, resources, and support needed for a strong start in life.

Our Head Start children engage in the Read Right from the Start program, focusing on language and literacy development through practice-based training for teachers. 90% of our Head Start children leave our YMCA Early Learning centers prepared for kindergarten in language and literacy, indicating they are on track for 3rd grade reading proficiency.

KEY PILLARS

Head Start programs take a comprehensive approach to supporting young children and their families through four key pillars.











YMCA OF METRO ATLANTA ENROLLMENT ELIGIBILITY

Head Start serves families with incomes below the U.S. Federal poverty guidelines, but eligibility also includes:

- Families receiving public assistance
- Children in foster care
- Up to 10% of slots for families with slightly higher incomes, only if spots are available

EXPANDING ACCESS TO EARLY EDUCATION: THE Y'S LEADERSHIP IN HEAD START

In 2024, the Office of Head Start awarded the YMCA of Metro Atlanta the Richmond County, Augusta, Georgia Head Start service area. Programs in this area faced potential closure, however the Y acted swiftly, leveraging its expertise to reopen Head Start programming.

The YMCA of Metro Atlanta's Head Start programs assures that parents have access to high-quality early childhood education and job opportunities while providing support and resources promoting their child's development at home.
